March meeting — 14 March, backup — backup — backup!

The Macintosh world is clearly divided into two distinct groups. Only a very small minority takes backup very seriously, and they go to endless lengths, including keeping backups off the premises, to safeguard their data. The rest of us feel guilty about the subject, from time to time, but do very, very little. Don has researched this subject for us, and will demonstrate simple, inexpensive backup strategies that **everyone** may benefit from. As he says:

“Those of you who were present at BMUG’s very first meeting way back in May of last year may remember that we presented a very short introduction to the importance of **backup** and **maintenance** in relation to the Macintosh.

BMUG firmly believes that it should aim to offer members the opportunity to better understand these two very significant aspects of computer use and to that end we intend to revisit the subject of **backup** at the March 14th meeting, when we will deal with such questions as:

Why we should backup? **What** we should backup? **How** we should backup?
When we should backup? **What** tools we may need to backup and so on.....

We hope to explain those things appropriate to your needs. We will also highlight and recommend a *virtual set and forget* backup regime that you may wish to follow.

It would be impossible to overstate the importance of computer backup so make sure you note your diary (or iCal) now and try not to miss this vital meeting.”

BMUG website upgrade

Hopefully members are making regular visits to our website, since our webmaster, Don, is constantly making constructive changes, and it rarely stays the same for more than a fortnight!

Have you ever wondered how that process happens? Well it's easy to describe, but often tedious and technical to achieve. Our website is constructed in iWeb, but as our ambitions have grown, we are now pushing the software further than it wants to go, and now Don is actually writing html code to make the site better for you.

Fortunately, the world-wide Mac network involves many generous and supportive people, and we have been greatly assisted with technical problems in implementing the changes discussed below by Michael in England, and Will in Atlanta, Georgia.

Every time we make changes to the website file, we need to upload them — that is send the modified files through the Internet to the far-off server in USA.

Once the changes are uploaded, the changes appear at the site that we see when we click on BMUG.

Here are some of the changes recently implemented. They will help everyday members greatly, but they will also make the club more attractive to virtual members, and here you can help. We all have a network of Mac friends. If they are unable to attend meetings, suggest they join as virtual members.

Buying & researching books online

Recently, Don recounted his negative experience with a supposedly major online retailer, and his account probably reinforced many people's negative attitude towards using the computer to buy things.

But was his experience typical?

Anyone who has visited the Craddock household knows that we are both addicted to reading and collecting books. Over the last 10 years, we have found the Internet to be simply indispensable for reading and book buying in a number of ways...

new book research & buying

There is no faster, easier way to research whether there is a new book on a particular topic than to do an Amazon search. Even when they don't stock the book, they are very likely to have the details; the author, publisher, maybe even a review. And I don't stop at *Amazon* — I invariably also check *Amazon UK*, because there are many books listed at one site, but not on the other. My wife is a student of French, so her primary research tool is *Amazon France*.

As you see here, my search on wooden boats has returned 5,847 results!

And we don't just research. Obviously we also buy books. Amazon's service is first class, their payment system secure, and the only negative is the price of postage. Whenever I want to buy a book, I check Amazon. Sometimes a book is so much cheaper, even when postage is added that I'll order it and wait the few days for the post to arrive.

I have **never** had a problem that Amazon wouldn't fix. On one occasion when a parcel was late, they promptly sent a duplicate. Needless to say, I soon had two identical parcels. When I let them know, they simply said, "give the other books to friend or a library, not a problem!"

Amazon has really smart software. they gently make suggestions, that I might also be interested in another book. They also enable me to keep a wish list of books I've looked up and may want to buy (or get for a present) one day.

I believe Amazon sets the standard all other retailers can be expected to match up to, and incidentally, they are great for CD's and DVD's, also.

Ian McEwan was born on 21 June 1948 in Aldershot, England. He studied at the University of Sussex, where he received a BA degree in English Literature in 1970. While completing his MA degree in English Literature at the University of East Anglia, he took a creative writing course taught by the novelists Malcolm Bradbury and Angus Wilson.

McEwan's works have earned him worldwide critical acclaim. Among them are the Somerset Maugham Award in 1976 for his first collection of short stories *First Love, Last Rites*; Whitbread Novel Award (1987) and Prix Fémina Etranger (1993) for *The Child in Time*; and Germany's Shakespeare Prize in 1999. He has been shortlisted for the Booker Prize for Fiction three times, winning the award for *Amsterdam* in 1998. His novel *Atonement* received the WH Smith Literary Award (2002), National Book Critics' Circle Fiction Award (2003), Los Angeles Times Prize for Fiction (2003), and the Santiago Prize for the European Novel (2004). In 2006, he won the James Tait Black Memorial Prize for his novel *Saturday*.

Second hand book research & buying

Books go out of print very quickly these days, and you don't have to be looking for a really old book to need to research the second-hand bookshops. Fortunately, we collectors are particularly well-served by central sites that present the stock of countless individual bookshops.

To save on postage, I always try in Australia first, and a site called *Books & Collectibles* brings together the stock of many local booksellers. For books from Britain, the US, or Canada, it's hard to beat *AbeBooks*. They list literally millions of titles.

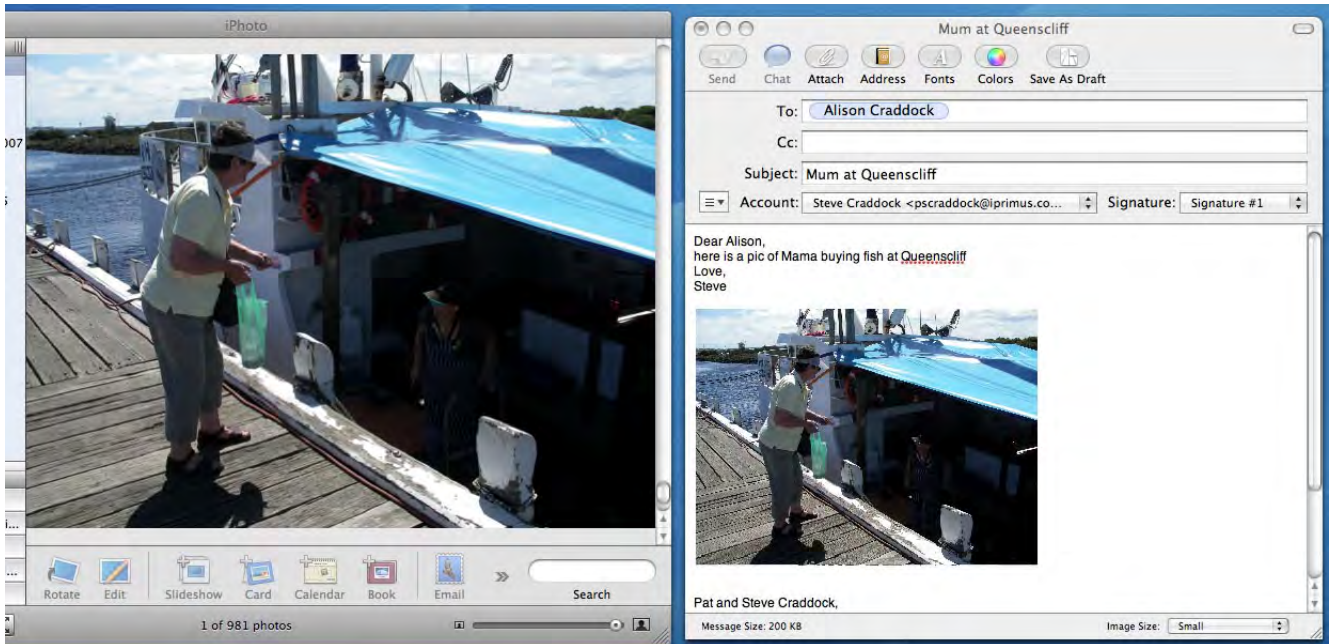


This month's TOP TIP

Thanks to Dick for suggesting we feature a TOP TIP at every meeting and in every newsletter. Our TOP TIPS are just like Jacques Reymond's "zis is ze secret!!" tips are to cooking — they are vital tools for doing a job right.

How often do you need to drag and drop files or images from one window to another? Perhaps you want to send a photo as an attachment to an email. Well here is the secret...

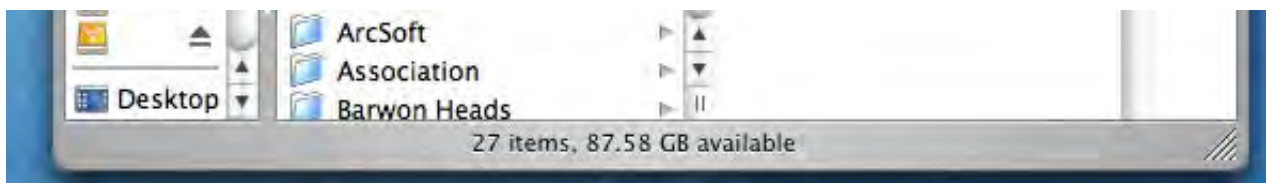
What you need is your iPhoto window right next to your email window. Then you can simply drag the image across and drop it in place .



But how do you resize a window and move it?

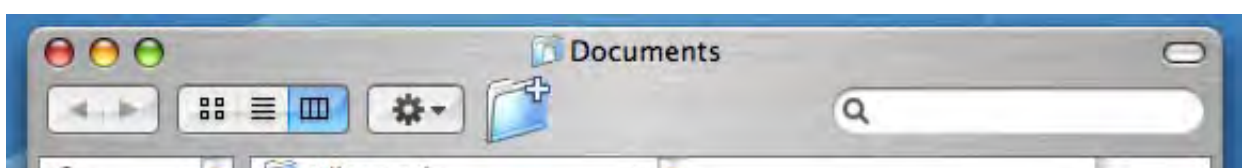
1. *resize a window*

Every Mac OS X window has a ribbed re-size handle at the bottom right-hand corner. You can grip and drag this handle to make the window any size and shape that you want.



2. *move a window*

Every window has a grey title bar at the top. Simply click and drag this area to move your window around to suit the task you are working on...



Voilà...
