Warning! Laptop screens are EXTREMELY FRAGILE....

Laptops quickly become part of family life, used all over the household or in the car, taken on holiday. Until the catastrophe happens, **how many of us are even aware of how fragile an LCD screen is!** Believe me, yours can end up looking like 7 years' extremely bad luck without your having any idea how it happened, without a mark on the case. I know because it happened to my wife's. And what did Apple want to charge to replace the screen on her \$1,500 laptop — more than \$1,200!

Fortunately, I found an alternative solution. I had the screen repaired with a 12 month warranty for \$538. It still hurt, but not half as much as \$1,200 would have! BMUG never recommends particular companies, but we do feel it's our role to point out ways our members can save money. If you have a similar problem you might want to try MacFixit. They are 'cheap', efficient, and the big surprise is that the repairs are done at an Apple Service centre, anyway.



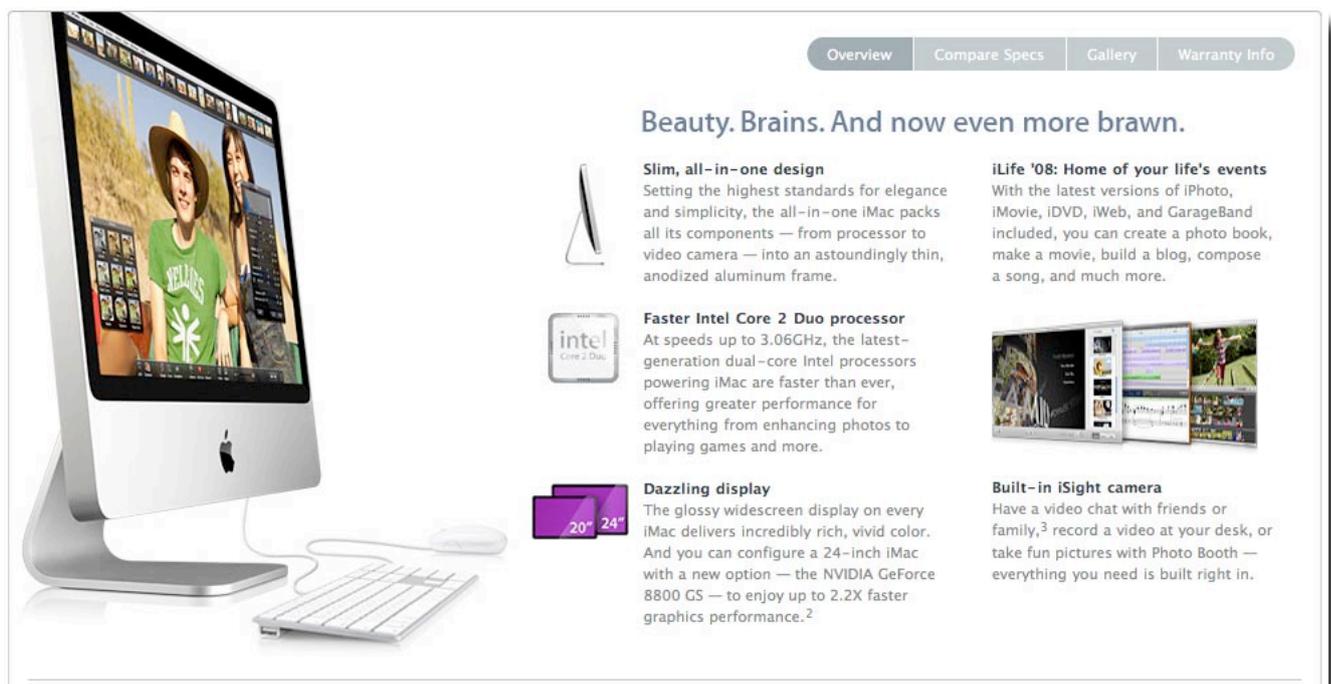
Members' marketplace — wanted or for sale...

Transferring files to a new Mac

an extract from our 'Buying a Mac' manual,
available from our free Download page,

Don't be daunted by this aspect of buying a new or second-hand computer, because Apple software makes it really easy. You will not only be able to transfer your files and your applications, but you will also transfer your Preferences, settings and other details so that the new computer will be quite familiar right from the start.

Tip: Macs that lack a FireWire port will not be able to transfer files in the way described below. You will need to get your files across by CD or other form of disk transfer.

1. Open Migration Assistant on the new Mac

This piece of software lives in Applications — Utilities.

From now on, simply follow the directions, screen by screen.



2. Cabling

You will be invited to join the two computers with a FireWire cable. The FireWire ports on the computers are indicated by this icon:



3. Restart the old Mac

The 'old' computer is the one **from** which you wish to transfer files. Hold down the 'T' key during the restart for a second or two until a big FireWire symbol appears on the screen. The old computer is now in file transfer mode, and will just sit there while you initiate the transfer by clicking various screens on the new computer



4. Settings and transfer through Migration Assistant

You will probably check 'From another Mac' and then you will get the opportunity at every stage to be specific about which user accounts and so on you want transferred. Most people will want *everything*, and the process will be initiated in just a few minutes. The actual transfer will take some time, so go and have a cuppa.

Tip: as an alternative, for example in the situation where your old internal hard disk had crashed, you could clone your stuff over from a Time Machine backup on an external hard disk.

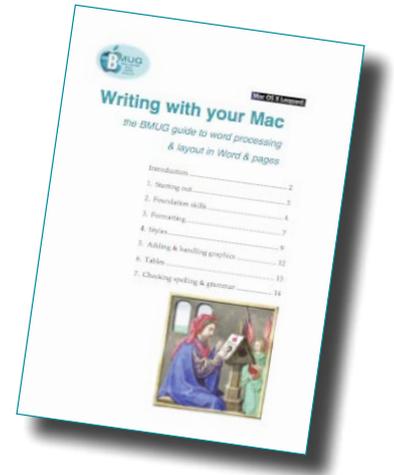

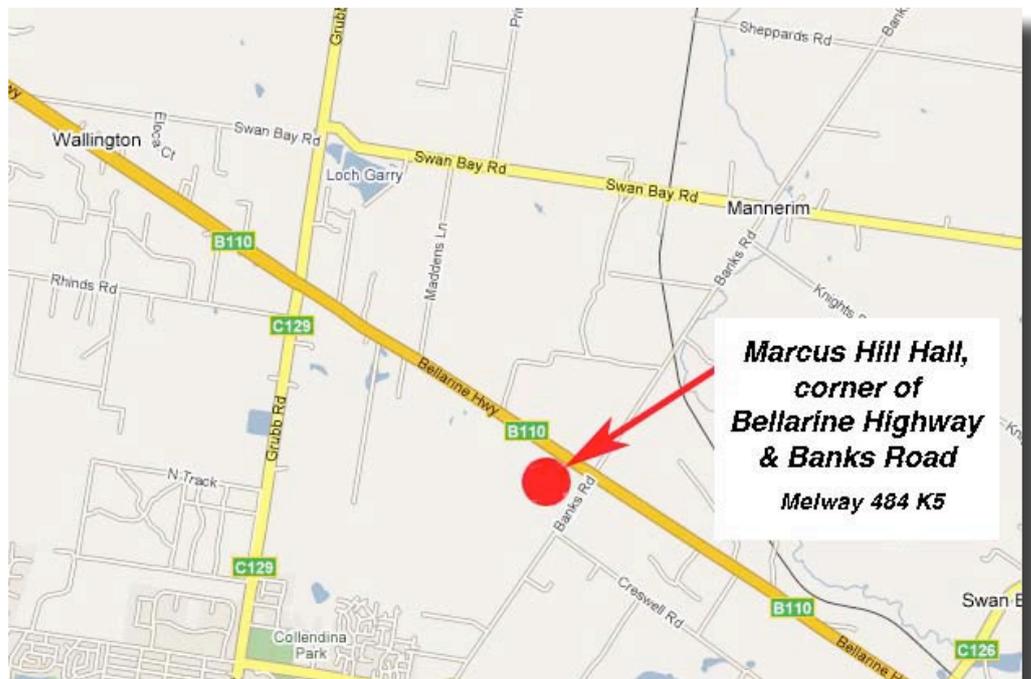

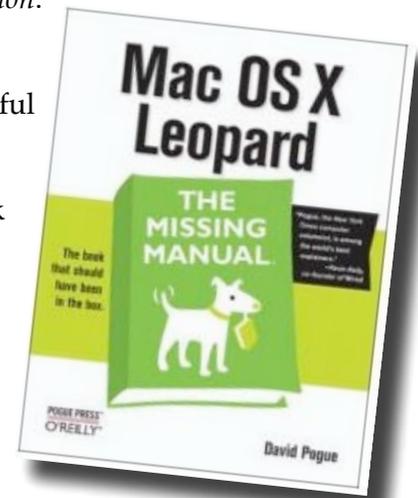

May TOP Tip — Reducing file size

Colin explored the various ways of reducing file size, a task we normally carry out if files are too big to email. He wrote a long article on this subject for his Queensland computer club — here is an edited summary of his findings...



Conclusions in a nutshell —Text, or text with images:

1. The best way to reduce the file size of a text document is by creating a pdf file then putting it through the “quartz filter” — this has security benefits also.
2. Microsoft Word is far superior to Pages in file size for the same text and images.
3. If you use Pages and include photos and clip art, file size increases dramatically.

Reducing image size:

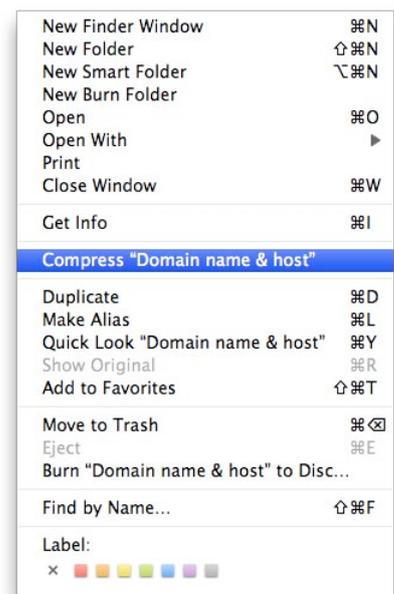
1. Select your photos in iPhoto, then click the email option. Now the reduced file sizes can be accessed.
2. Alternatively, drag your photos to Mail, then use the photo size options at the bottom right corner.
3. Yet another way of reducing photograph file size is to export them to the Desktop and Zip them.

Colin’s experiments:

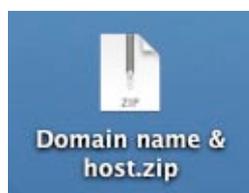
Ideally any files created through compression must be able to be read by both Macs and PC’s, so I tried:

1. Zipping

Highlight the file then go to File — Compress. This creates ‘Zip’ files:



and on the desktop, a Zipped file looks like this:

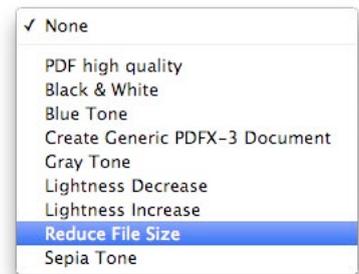




2. Converting the file to pdf format

Start by opening the file. Go to File, and select Print. Go to PDF and click and select 'Save as a pdf file'.

Then reduce the pdf file by using the quartz filter. Open the pdf file. Select File and 'Save As'. Go to Quartz Filter at the bottom of the window, and select 'Reduce File Size'.



After many experiments, I concluded:

- Microsoft Word is a far superior program to Pages in terms of minimising file size- with the same information- — and if you don't need the *bells and whistles*, TextEdit is more effective still.
- In Compressing the files (Zip) and quartz filter file (pdf) reduction are very similar.
- Creating a Zip file is easier and faster than creating a pdf file then shrinking it using the quartz filter
- Pdf files cannot be changed. They have a security advantage.
- Creating pdf files from Pages documents reduces their size. This is not necessarily the case with Word documents.
- Converting a file to pdf format does not ALWAYS reduce its size.
- Integrating photos and clip art into a Pages document will blow the size up to unacceptable levels, far more than in a Word document
